### **News Items**

It is with great regret that I inform you of the passing of former colleagues and Spartan members, and special friends of our group.

**George Larder** noticed in a recent Saturday's Montreal Gazette the obituary for **Cathy Heaney**. If memory is correct, Cathy worked in Spar's traffic department. Some may remember her late husband Bob who worked for Spar and then NSI, until they declared bankruptcy in year 2000.

Old friend **Dave Andean**, a long time employee of the Communications Research Centre CRC informed us of the death of **Bob Warren**, a Canadian space pioneer whom I knew well from working together on the ISIS scientific satellite program and the Communications Technology Satellite CTS program. He died on Saturday, June 1 at 86 years of age and had been in poor health for a while. This year, Bruce will celebrate his 90<sup>th</sup> birthday, and we will be celebrating and capturing his career through the online exhibition, which will open this summer."

In the near future I hope that we will have an occasion to bring all the RADARSAT 1 family together to celebrate RADARSAT 1's contributions nationally and internationally, and to thank all the pioneers who conceived, developed, built, operated, and used this unique Canadian success.
